V. PUBLIC HEARING

Pauline Belal, 74 Gordon St., appeared to speak regarding the carbon monoxide poisoning incident at Cranston High School East on November 1, 2017 and stated that she has made several requests to have the school tested for carbon monoxide. She stated that as of last week, there are many parents whose children have tested positive for carbon monoxide. The parents are requesting that the City conduct a proper sealed test of the school. She indicated that her daughter has been out of school for five months due to carbon monoxide poisoning and her education is being affected.

Ed Marrapese, 122 Waterman Ave., former coach, former School Committee Member and former State Representative, appeared to speak regarding an incident he has involved in at Dave's Market parking lot, where he was approached by Sgt. Antonucci, questioned and handcuffed and after a few minutes was released. He stated that he had only asked for an apology from the two officers, which he did not get. He asked that the Council follow the lead of the City of Providence by creating a committee made up of independent people from the public to oversee the Police Department, which would look at Police harassing the public and other incidents and report back to the City Council. Councilman Stycos stated that since the Safety Services and Licenses Committee is meeting in a week, he asked that Colonel Winqvist provide that Committee a report on this incident. Councilman Stycos also asked that the Fire Marshall also attend the Safety Services and Licenses Committee to address the carbon monoxide situation at Cranston High School East and the School Department also be present at that meeting.

Councilman Lanni stated that if the incident between Mr. Marrapese and the Police Department is going to be before the Safety Services and Licenses Committee, the City Council should be provided with a copy of the City of Providence Ordinance as to how their Board that oversees the Police Department works and how it is made up and how the civilians on the Board are chosen.

Council President Farina asked that the Administration if they can obtain the information needed for Monday's Safety Services meeting. Director Lopez requested that this issue be placed on the May Safety Services agenda since we are coming up with the Budget hearings.

Councilman McAuley asked that the Cranston High School East carbon monoxide issue be placed on Monday's Safety Services agenda.

Council President Farina stated that the Police matter be heard at the May Safety Services meeting and the Cranston East carbon monoxide issue be placed on this Monday's Safety Services meeting.

Suzanne Arena, 88 Lakeland Rd., appeared to speak regarding "Resolution encouraging the Rhode Island General Assembly to pass legislation requiring seat belts in school buses" and asked if the seat belts would only be placed in new buses and the current ones be grandfathered in. She also spoke regarding proposed Ordinance 3-18-03 being introduced this evening and stated that she would like to see "jewel" added to the Ordinance since this is a hot thing right now. Council President Farina stated that the Ordinance addresses all electronic tobacco, which would cover that. Councilman Paplauskas addressed the question asked by Ms. Arena regarding seat belts in school buses and stated that as of January 1, 2020, the General Assembly would mandate this.

Janice Ruggieri, School Committee Chair, appeared to speak regarding the Cranston High School East carbon monoxide incident and stated that as of today, no information has been received from the Department of Health of carbon monoxide poisoning. She also indicated that multiple tests were done by various state and local agencies and all results came back negative.

X. COUNCIL MEMBER COMMUNICATIONS
(Continued to next month's meeting)

COUNCILMAN LANNI:

- *Adm. report on feasibility of police substation in Edgewood. Continued 12/18/2017*

Director Lopez talked to Colonel Winqvist and the Police Department is in the process of setting up a substation at Hall Manor.

- *Updated report from Adm. on legal costs for Guilbeault case*

Director Strom presented legal fees report.

- *Adm. report on flooding issue at Garden and Marborough intersection*

Director Lopez stated that John Corso, Highway Superintendent, is working on the project. He will follow up with him ad report at the next meeting or email Councilman Lanni on the report.

-MARCH 26, 2018-

- ***Parking ban enforcement procedures***

Director Lopez stated that the City tries to enforce this as best it can. There are patrol officers that go through the neighborhoods and will either ticket the vehicle or have it towed if it is in the way of the plow trucks.

Councilman Stycos asked number of cars that were ticketed this year in violation of the parking ban and number of vehicles that were towed. Director Lopez stated that he will email this information to all the Council members.

Councilman Hopkins stated that he has been contacted by Cranston High School East students stating that when there is a parking ban, where they can't park on the streets and they can't park in the City Hall parking lot, they are ticketed for parking in City Hall parking spaces. He questioned how this can be resolved. Director Lopez stated that parking space in City Hall parking lot is and has been a problem, but City Hall staff need to park in the lot to come to work.

COUNCILMAN STYCOS:

- ***Warming Centers – Adm. report on RIEMA***

Director Lopez stated that he addressed this issue with the Fire Chief and there was misinformation with REMA and that has been clarified. He also indicated that there are shelters by the State, which people can take advantage of those places. Last time he checked, there were no requests made from Cranston residents for shelters, but the City is prepared should the need arise. Councilman Stycos said that there needs to be clarification as to which are 24 hour warming centers.

- ***Illegal car repair operations at 1850 Broad and 111 Beckwith***

Councilman Stycos stated that in September, people started calling Building Inspections of an illegal car repair business at this location and nothing happened until Stan Pikul, the Building Inspector was able to convince the landlord to evict the person operating this illegal business. Councilman Stycos stated that there needs to be a solution to the problem because if the person had a license to operate, he could have been called in for a Show Cause, but he did not have a license. He also stated that he sees that the City does not fine people in Cranston whether through Municipal Court or through Code violations.

Attorney Kirshenbaum suggested that there needs to be an independent inspector who goes out and writes tickets for violators and send them to Municipal Court. That person would be a liaison between the Building Inspector's Office, the Clerk's Office and Municipal Court.

Councilman Papluskas stated that the Cranston Police Department can also issue tickets to violators.

Councilman Stycos stated that he will bring this issue up at the Budget hearings.

- ***Cullion Property***

Councilman Stycos stated that he received documents of easement and a preliminary management plan from DEM for the Cullion property. He thinks it would be worth talking to DEM of whether there could be a dog park at this site. We ought to find out if there is some flexibility with that property.

Councilman Stycos asked Attorney Kirshenbaum, since the Cumberland Farms matter is coming up, how people get certified as expert witnesses when a matter comes before the City Council. Attorney Kirshenbaum stated that if you had someone before you with a particular expertise, they would provide documentation as to expertise the night of the hearing.

-MARCH 26, 2018-

COUNCILMAN MCAULEY:

- *Aqueduct Road complaints*

Councilman McAuley thanked Director Lopez and Suzanne Arena for bringing the problems at this location to his attention.

- *Concerns after Gem fire*

Councilman McAuley stated that he has concerns of the close proximity of the Day Care to this business. He spoke to Chief McKenna and the Fire Marshall and they found that it is in compliance with the existing zoning. He asked if the Administration is comfortable with the situation and if there are any concerns of the Administration. Director Lopez stated that he can't be too detailed on this issue since there is potential litigation involved. He also stated that the Administration is doing their due diligence in looking at the particular building. He also stated that the City is continuing to monitor the firefighters who were involved in the fire. This is a priority for the Administration and in making sure that this does not happen again.

Councilman Hopkins stated that he has received a number of complaints of number of trucks using Aqueduct Rd. because of Dave's Market as a cut through. He suggested possibly installing "no through trucking" signs or increase Police detail. Director Lopez stated that he will have signage looked into.

COUNCILMAN ARCHETTO:

- *Security at City Hall*

Councilman Archetto stated that during these meetings, there is no one monitoring the first and second floor of City Hall. There was a vagrant found passed out in the 3rd floor bathroom. We need to address this in a pro-active way.

Council Vice-President Favicchio stated that the newly created City and School Safety Sub-Committee will address this issue and will be part of the recommendation that will be made to the City Council.

COUNCILMAN PAPLAUSKAS:

- *Wal-mart plaza overnight trucks, trash and debris on property*

Councilman Paplauskas asked Director Lopez if he has spoken to the owner of the property. Director Lopez stated, not recently, but he can reach out to them. Councilman Paplauskas asked that Director Lopez also ask property owner that crosswalks within the plaza be installed per requests.

COUNCILMAN COLFORD:

- *Process for Filing Claims and Appeal Process*

Councilman Colford stated that claimants of three claims that were approved at the last Claims Committee meeting have contacted him as Chair of the Claims Committee and asked that their claim be revisited by the Claims Committee. Councilman Colford also stated that the Council should allow them to resubmit their claim and rehear them and then discuss how appeals can be handled.

Council President Farina questioned whether appeals be handled by the Solicitor's Office. Director Lopez stated that he will look into that with the Solicitor as to the appeals procedure.

Councilman Lanni stated that the Claims Committee should handle this without setting up a procedure that involves other people.

-MARCH 26, 2018-

Attorney Kirshenbaum stated that what past practice has been is if there was any new information that was not brought before the Committee the first time, the Committee would revisit the claim. The Committee would not rehear the same claim over and over.

Councilman Archetto stated that he would be in favor of setting up an appeal process and in all fairness to the public, the public needs another resource.

Solicitor Verdecchia stated that he will be meeting with the Clerk's Office to try to amend the process of how claims are filed and the process they go through to try to streamline the process.

Director Strom stated that he will be looking at major claims to have a claims company with deductibility. He may have some figures when we go through the Budget process. He will have the results for either April or May.
